

This vision reveals that the government of God is not built upon organization, but upon nature. Authority in heaven flows from what something is, not merely from what something is called.

The four living creatures stand in the midst and around the Throne, revealing the nature through which Christ rules. The lion reveals dominion and fearless authority. The ox reveals servanthood and sacrificial strength. The face of a man reveals understanding, and the mind of God. The eagle reveals heavenly vision and spiritual movement. These four faces reveal the fullness of Christ's ruling nature.



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They show that divine government operates through power, humility, wisdom, and heavenly perspective in perfect balance.

Surrounding the Throne are the twenty-four elders, seated upon thrones and crowned with authority. Yet these elders continually cast their crowns before the Throne, declaring that all authority originates from God and belongs to Him. Their position reveals maturity. Their crowns reveal authority. Their worship reveals submission. This shows that true dominion is not independent of God, but fully yielded to Him.

This vision reveals the administration of Christ's Finished Work. Jesus Christ, through His death and resurrection, established His Throne in heaven and earth.
