

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Book of Revelation: Introduction

Before the seals were opened... before the trumpets sounded... before the kingdoms of this world became the kingdoms of our Lord... John saw something standing before the Throne.

He saw fire.

Not one flame.

Seven.

“And there were seven lamps of fire burning before the throne, which are the seven Spirits of God.”

— Revelation 4:5

This was not decoration.

This was not symbolism without substance.

This was revelation of power.

For the Throne of God does not stand alone.

It operates.

It governs.

It administers.



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Seven Spirits of God are the fullness of that operation.

The Book of Revelation does not present a passive throne, but a living throne — a throne from which proceeds light, authority, judgment, reconciliation, and dominion. The Seven Spirits of God are revealed as the sevenfold fullness of the Spirit through which the Throne expresses its will and accomplishes its purpose.

These Seven Spirits are seen again when John beholds the Lamb:

“And I beheld, and, lo, in the midst of the throne... stood a Lamb... having seven horns and seven eyes, which are the seven Spirits of God sent forth into all the earth.”

— Revelation 5:6

This reveals a profound mystery:

The Seven Spirits belong to the Lamb.

They proceed from the Throne.

They are sent into the earth.

This means the Seven Spirits are the operational fullness of Christ's authority and life.

They are not separate spirits.

He sees seven flames of fire.

The Book of Revelation Identifies the Seven Spirits of God as Seven Lamps of Fire

John writes:

“And there were seven lamps of fire burning before the throne, which are the seven Spirits of God.”

— Revelation 4:5



This is the first time in the throne vision that the Seven Spirits of God are revealed in their governmental position.

They are not beneath the Throne.

They are not behind the Throne.

They are before the Throne.

Burning.

Active.

Present.

This reveals that the Throne of God is not passive.

It is operational.

The Seven Spirits of God are revealed as flames of fire because fire represents divine activity, purification, illumination, and power.

These are not literal flames.

They are the living fullness of God's Spirit in operation.

This means the Throne governs through the Spirit.

The Throne expresses its authority through the Spirit.
